






Hello & welcome




With thanks to the British Council, b-side have co-commissioned a major new Augmented Reality artwork by artist Babar Suleman. Working with the London College of Communications and Creatives Garage (Nairobi, Kenya) b-side undertook an international open call, resulting in Suleman's 'Requital.'

Babar Suleman has created a thought-provoking artwork (spanning augmented reality and moving image) invoking the myth of the siren – infamous for luring sailors to their deaths – on the site of Portland's Grade II listed lighthouse, Portland Bill.



THAT OTHER PLACE

That Other Place is an evolving and on-going queer led arts programme conceived by **b-side** and Creatives Garage (Nairobi, Kenya). It is a programme and a place that recognises the insufficiency of our current real and physical lands to hold all of our lives. We are commissioning international artists to create works that can be experienced physically and online and that look to other ways we might see and experience the land around us.







As ever, our programme is made in response to the island and, this year, thanks to funding from the National Heritage Lottery Fund, we are delighted to launch This Land – a project taking a closer look at the Portland environment and what makes the island such a special place. Exploring land use and access, land and property rights, biodiversity and climate change, This Land aims to gather and share knowledge to help protect and enhance the environment and character of Portland. The project is focusing on researching two fragile and unique natural and built heritage sites identified as 'at risk': the remains of a Tudor cottage in Brandy Row, and the Last Landscape in the South of the island.

Portland is a curious island – intensive quarrying having drastically changed what was once a land of open pasture and grazing sheep. A land where enclosure came late – fiercely resisted by the people here. The remnants of some of this agricultural past remain in the landscape below the village of Southwell. We are studying this area at the far tip of the island, with a particular focus on the distinct ecology relating to its limestone geology with habitats supporting rare plant species and wildlife. In contrast, over the past few months our researcher, Dr Jeanie Sinclair, has been working with residents investigating the history of a ruined Tudor cottage on the seafront at Chiswell, revealing fascinating stories of the lives of the people that lived there. We are joined in this ongoing research by artists Emily Tracy, Kneed, Wildworks and Heinrich & Palmer who have been commissioned to work with residents and create artworks to be shown at next year's festival. 2022's festival sees the initial sharing of what we have uncovered so far.

COMMON LANDS: WHO DO WE THINK WE ARE?

Over the years, b-side artists from both on and off the island have created artworks that celebrate, question and provoke thoughts on place, identity and belonging. Lots of us have taken part by sharing our special places here on the island and sometimes we've lamented those places we can no longer live.

This year, and going forward, we want to widen the lens and extend the conversation further. We want to go deeper in our exploration of belonging, displacement and thoughts on migration – historical and contemporary, and both on and off the island, by inviting new voices to add richness, inspiration and challenge to the conversation.

We are delighted that two artists, Belinda Zhawi and Ioannis Panagiotou, will be sharing with you their responses to the theme Who Do We Think We Are?

Belinda's sound and poetry installation, Viva Voce, will trace the movement of tides, people, animals and goods. Using the Rivers Thames and Exe as a starting point, Belinda's work will blend reflections on two great rivers bound together by a shared history of trade, movement and migration.

Ioannis' multi-media installation and live music performance, Pilgrim's Horses, marks the one hundred year anniversary of the Asia Minor Catastrophe. Using Portland bridleways to imagine and trace the journey on horseback by one of his relatives, the work seeks to discover lost memories and stories of diaspora. Ioannis will be joined by Lithuanian guitarist Danguole Lingyte. **See pages 35/41**

INACCURATE RECORDINGS: MAPPING PORTLAND'S LANDSCAPE USING PRINT AND SOUND

Chiswell Walled Garden becomes a drop-in laboratory for the day. Explore the weird and wonderful landscape of Portland, focusing on and around the distance between Chiswell Walled Garden to Brandy Row – a short route, with a lot to be uncovered.

Ishwari and Leonie will use PRINT and SOUND to research this stretch of land in imaginative ways and invite you to walk and make art with them – paying attention to the margins, to what lies underneath the surface, and across the past, present and future.

Including printing activities such as Cyanotype, light-printing, flower pounding, pencil rubbings and drawing. Sound-based activities include recording using contact mics, recording underwater and building musical instruments from local materials. Throughout the day, they will be adding these prints and sounds to make a layered 'map' of the area surrounding the Walled Garden and Brandy Row – building upon old/new, factual/fictional, historic/futuristic stories.



Screening begins at half past and on the hour.

Kimberlin is a short film, first completed in 2019, with a 2022 cut to be premiered at this year's festival. The film is about the discovery of an underground cinema cavern on the Isle of Portland: the uncanny discovery and subsequent breaking news begin to generate speculation amongst islanders as to who created the cavern and the cannisters film found within it. Kimberlin features a specially commissioned soundtrack by acclaimed composer Abul Mogard.

It appears we are under siege! On Portland the sea encroaches, landslips erode the island's cliffs, slowly but surely. Inland, the quarries that scar the landscape eventually grow over, interring dialect and song. The super-8mm films found inside the cinema cavern also bear scars – scratches and burns in the emulsion surface, in which are recorded images of Portland's landscape and fauna. Field recordings of fog horns and the trilling of songbirds pass through the filters of Abul's synthesiser, emerging as faint memories of place: echoes of the digital future of an England now difficult to grasp. Where "quarry bells no longer ring, except in old men's dreams".

ONE IN TWELVE

Steve Urghart

One in twelve people living on Portland are being held in custody. From their perspective, what does the island sound like? Step inside a structure beside a prison wall, to hear what they hear.

Steve Urquhart – much of whose career has been spent working and recording in UK prisons – invites listeners to engage with a deep-listening soundscape, recorded by serving prisoners inside the cells, landings, common areas and exercise yards of the island's secure estate. This site-specific audio work is installed right next to Portland Prison, in The Old Engine Shed, which relied historically on convict labour. Now a disused Grade II Listed building, the shed was created in the mid-1800s to house locomotives serving the Admiralty Quarries, with prisoners laying down the railway tracks.

This revealing, uncompromising, multi-layered audio installation challenges the listener to reconsider their perceptions of sound, to reassess the purpose of detainment and to confront notions of incarceration and liberation. The installation features selected artworks by prisoners and secure patients from the collection of Koestler Arts

Sculptural installation – a final resting place for the stones from the Portland Stone Rehabilitation Centre.

In 2018, artist Leni Dothan transported two hundred Portland stones to London, where they were exposed to the city's pollution, and then returned to Portland to be rehabilitated in Portland's clean air, having been previously coated with a pollution reactive solution that revealed the 'healing' process. You may have seen the stones and witnessed parts of this process at the High Angle Battery during the 2018 b-side festival.

In this next stage of the project, these stones, having returned to their homeland, now form a live demonstration of how nature re-establishes itself, as the stones are gradually colonised by organisms and become, once again, a part of the landscape.

In their newly-assembled position on the windswept hillside of the last remaining area of agricultural Portland, the stones will be exposed to the elements allowing them to reclaimed by nature.

THIS LAND: THE LAST LANDSCAPE EXHIBITION

Dominated by the iconic lighthouse, the surrounding landscape at Portland Bill is often overlooked. Find out more about the Last Landscape in this exhibition of photographs and information.

Prior to the rapid acceleration of quarrying in the late 1800s, Portland was an agricultural landscape with large areas of open grassland and multiple small strip fields used for growing crops and grazing sheep. The land between the village of Southwell and Portland Bill is now the only significant area of the island where this landscape remains largely untouched by quarrying, and where the original land surface and substrate remains. Here, traces of Portland's agricultural past remain, with ancient strip field systems still visible. There is also

evidence of prehistoric occupation, including the site of a Mesolithic settlement and an incredible diversity of plant and wildlife relating to its particular geology and coastal position. Over the coming months, we will be investigating the history of this land and how we can best support the diversity of wildlife found here.

REQUITAL. THE LIGHTHOUSE AS THE SIREN

The masculine and phallic physical structure of the lighthouse is combined digitally with the typically female and mythical figure of the siren through augmented reality and moving image.

Sirens, in myth, brought sailors to their doom by luring them into shipwrecks at their islands while lighthouses are beacons acting as navigational aid, bringing maritime pilots to safety. Both are an invitation, providing direction. It is interesting to note that a 'siren', as a famously female figure, is seen as 'negative' while the phallic lighthouse as 'positive'. Requital. subverts and cuts across these clean lines for a work that is more paradoxical than these polarities.

An ode to unrequited love, Requital. finds a metaphor in the Isle of Portland's history as a quarry site for when love is taken but not given, not reciprocated; much like how Portland stone has been taken by man for ages to build elsewhere.






